Students in Mrs. Nicole Kurata's Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) class at WIS participated in the national writing competition DtWT, which gives students a voice in dealing with the challenges of violence within their homes and/or community and allows them to be agents of change.

The DtWT program, a national initiative, empowers middle school students to become catalysts for positive transformation by delving into the complex origins and far-reaching consequences of youth violence. Through introspective writing, guided by three fundamental questions: What fuels youth violence? How has violence touched your life? What actions can you take to mitigate it? Students are encouraged to critically examine their experiences and envision solutions.

Keziah's selection underscored the profound impact of her reflections on these critical questions. Her essay not only articulated the causes and personal impact of violence, but also offered meaningful way and is so deserving of a compelling vision for change. Mrs. this award."

In today's digital world, the ability to tell your story through video is more than a skill — it's a powerful tool for expression, empowerment and economic opportunity. The youth in the Nanakuli valley are rich in stories of strength, resilience and aloha, but without access to basic media training or equipment, they are left voiceless in a world where storytelling is like currency. While Wai'anae High has Searider Productions, Nānākuli High and Intermediate School (NHIS) currently has no such program or class offerings. That absence places all of the Nānākuli youth at a disadvantage as they transition into higher education or the workforce.

Content creation is one of the fastest-growing fields today, with platforms

like YouTube, TikTok and Instagram creating viable career pathways. But these are only accessible if NHIS students have a foundational understanding of storytelling, editing software, lighting and audio. In addition, there is also a growing demand for Native and Indigenous filmmakers to tell their stories — from their perspective — with cultural integrity and authenticity. If we don't train our haumana to take on these roles, others will tell "our" stories for us. It is hoped with this great win, we can showcase what our students can accomplish and begin to build a digital program

#### WCCHC Names its First Mobile Dental Clinic "Kukui O Kaniela"

On March 27, the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (WCCHC) held a blessing ceremony to unveil a major milestone — the launch of their very first Mobile Dental Clinic. This initiative reflects years of vision and persistence to expand access to high-quality oral healthcare for our keiki and underserved communities across the West Oʻahu region.

In a moving moment during the ceremony, WCCHC honored the legacy of Dr. Dan Fujii, retired Dental Director who built the foundation of their dental department, by naming the Mobile Clinic in his honor: Kukui O Kaniela, or "The Light of Dan."

The Mobile Dental Clinic is more than just a van — it's a fully equipped dental facility on wheels, capable of

This mobile van joins a growing list of investments in oral health by WCCHC, including the recent expansion of the Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Dental Clinic.

delivering dental exams, cleanings, fluoride treatments, X-rays, and minor restorative services right where they're needed most. The new mobile unit is made possible through a \$400,000 grant from the Hawaii Dental Service (HDS) Foundation, which partnered with WCCHC to expand access to oral healthcare in underserved areas. The HDS Foundation is a leading dental benefits provider serving Hawai'i, Guam and Saipan. Starting March 31, the mobile dental clinic expanded existing WCCHC dental outreach and services and will continue visiting every elementary school on the Wai'anae Coast as well as HCAP Head Start preschools in West O'ahu.

#### When the Lights Go Out: What to Do and Why It Matters

If you've ever been stuck in traffic on Farrington Highway during a power outage, you already know how chaotic it gets when traffic lights go dark. Intersections become confusing, tempers flare and safety takes a hit. One of the most frequent questions I get is: "Why doesn't anyone come to direct traffic when this happens?"

Here's the answer I've received directly from Honolulu Police Department (HPD) — they dispatch officers based on 911 calls. That means if the public doesn't report an outage, HPD may not be aware of it — or may not prioritize it if there are more urgent calls coming in.

It might feel strange calling 911 for a Continued on page 6



number for life-threatening emergencies. But in this case, 911 is exactly the right number to call. Dispatch can then assign an officer or officers and notify the proper agency to get someone on scene.

Of course, we still have broader issues — HPD is facing staffing shortages, and DOT infrastructure updates take time. But the more we use the process that exists, the stronger our case

becomes for investment and change.

If the lights are out, treat the intersection as a four-way stop. And if no one is responding, make the call. It's not just about keeping traffic moving — it's about keeping our community safe.


















KUPUNA, OUR COMMUNITY NEEDS YOU TO HELP STOP MEASLES—BEFORE IT STARTS

Measles is making a comeback. Right now, outbreaks on the continent are spreading fast-especially in places where not enough people are vaccinated. Measles outbreaks don't just happen randomly; they spread like wildfire in communities that aren't well protected.

And here's the hard truth: Hawai'i is at even greater risk than Texas where the current outbreak started. Texas has a measles vaccination rate of 94.35%-just below the safety threshold of 95% for herd immunity. Hawai'i's rate? Only 86.4 percent! It's one of the most infectious diseases we know of. So, when measles spreads, it spreads fast-infecting 15 to 18 unvaccinated people for every single case.

We already have a warning sign. One confirmed measles case in a child who had recently traveled internationally triggered widespread distress and anxiety. Just one case created ripple effects through every airport, baggage claim, gate, plane, and restaurant the family passed through. Airline staff, TSA agents, baggage handlers, and travelers were all put on alert. Everyone had to doublecheck their vaccination status.

Sure, most people who get it will survive, but some don't. And many who do are left with lifelong damagepneumonia, deafness, brain damage, and a weakened immune system that makes them sick for years. A measles outbreak here would disrupt daily life for everyone-especially our keiki. Schools could close. Sports and public gatherings might be canceled again. Families would fear letting their children leave the house.

Hawai'i has already suffered from measles before. In 1848-1849, a measles epidemic killed at least 10,000 Native Hawaiians-maybe one-fifth of the entire population. It came alongside whooping cough and influenza, devastating families and accelerating population decline. The epidemic destabilized the Hawaiian Kingdom and marked a turning point in our history. Our ancestors had no vaccine. We do. But if we don't choose to use it, measles could hurt our people again.

If you were born before the 1960s. you may remember the fear of measles. But today's parents have never seen it. They may not understand how serious it really is. Tell younger generations why we can't let measles return. Encourage every parent you know to check their child's vaccination records. If their keiki

haven't had both doses of the MMR (measles-mumps-rubella) vaccine, now is the time!


The opening act was amazing! It was probably my favorite part of the show. In the opening scene, everyone sings the song "Circle of Life." Leah Ange-


Mufasa teaches young Simba a lesson about the circle of life.
